

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

ROBERT N. TERRY has directed twice for Kentwood Players, "Maybe Tuesday," and "Two for the Seesaw." He has also received our Masque award twice for best supporting actor for his parts in "See How They Run," and "The Rainmaker." His recent professional appearances have been on tour and on Broadway in "The Captains and the Kings" and in summer stock in 1962 in the part of Doctor Morrissey in this play.



ABOUT THE CAST . . .

ELIZABETH THORNBURGH (Judy) was last seen in "Desperate Hours." Prior to that her last stage appearance was in "Janus" at the Pumphouse Theatre. Though she has not been an actress too frequently of late, she is one of our most active members and served a two-year stint as president from 1960-1962. Elizabeth was a charter member when Kentwood Players was organized thirteen years ago.

NORMAN ANDREWS (George) first appeared with Kentwood Players as the Professor in "All the King's Men." He has a B.A. in Theatre Arts from UCLA; received a two-year scholarship from the Studio of Dramatic Arts in New York; and was a winner of the outstanding actor award from Alpha Epsilon Rho, national TV fraternity. He has had vast experience with many groups, including five seasons of summer stock.

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PETER DAVID (Vito), who is appearing for the first time with Kentwood Players, just graduated from Westchester high school. He was in their "Teahouse of the August Moon," portraying the role of Captain Fisby. He was a member of the Westchester Junior Playhouse at age 5.

CHARLES REYNOLDS (Bert) received the 1961-1962 Masque Award for best actor for his role of Jack Burden in "All the King's Men." More recently, he portrayed Edward Middleton in "The Drunkard." Chuck is production manager for KP and is responsible for most of the set designs here at Westchester Playhouse.

FRANK PITT (Doctor) is best remembered for the part of Elwood in "Harvey." He was also in "Make a Million," "Rainmaker," and "All the King's Men." In addition to his on-stage appearances, Frank has served as house manager and vice-president for the group. He was active in little theatre in Canada, and soon will become a U.S. citizen.

SAM DICKERMAN (Arnold) was nominated for best supporting actor for his role of juror number three in "Twelve Angry Men" at Morgan Theatre last year. For Players' Ring Gallery, he portrayed the role of a senator in "Best Man." His prior appearance with Kentwood Players was in "Desperate Hours."

DEREK CADMAN (First Passerby) is vice-president of KP and editor of the monthly Bulletin. This is his first appearance in a major production. He served as producer for "Lullaby" and "Dark at the Top of the Stairs."

IRVING ROSEN (Mr. Akins) won the 1961 Masque award as best actor for his portrayal of Snogg in "Red Shoes." He has also appeared in "Janus" and "Detective Story and was active in little theatre in New York.
