#### ABOUT THE PLAY . . .

"TIME OF THE CUCKOO" opened on Broadway, October 15, 1952 and was immediately acclaimed the hit of the season. The play's foremost champion was the influential Brooks Atkinson, N.Y. Times critic who saw in the poignant Arthur Laurents story, a theme of sensitive realism portrayed in a moving and rewarding manner and one in which the stage would be richer still when seen by theatregoers the world over.

The play analyzes an American tourist abroad by showing how the forces which have shaped this woman at home come into conflict with the Mores of the Old World.

#### ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

FARNOL FRANCIS, a charter member of Kentwood Players marks his return to the directing ranks with this production. His last Kentwood directing assignment was, MY THREE ANGELS. He has been seen on stage too, appearing in ALL THE KING'S MEN and THE RAIN-MAKER" among others. Arizona State University claimed his acting and directing talents for many years. During Kentwood's past seasons he has directed, ANNA LUCASTA and THE WIZARD OF OZ.

#### WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST . . .

CONNIE BAURAC (Leona Samish) brings to Kentwood a wide experience in the theatre having worked professionally with stock and repertory companies in the midwest. Closer to home, her appearances include roles with, The Call Board Theatre, Pasadena Playhouse, Long Beach Community Players, Whittier Community Players, Tustin Playbox and other groups in So. Calif. This marks her debut with Kentwood.

MICHAEL J. D'ASARO (Renato Di Rossi) as Chief of Speech Pathology and audiology at the Kennedy Child Study Center, St. John's Hospital is making his first appearance on the Kentwood stage. With a Ph.D. degree in Speech, he taught that subject for seven years at UCLA before succumbing to the acting bug.

JEAN KLIPPER (Signora Fioria) last appeared in Kentwood's ALL THE KING'S MEN, also in THE EMPEROR'S NEW CLOTHES. Jean studied at the Theatre of Arts in L.A. and appeared around town in such plays as TUNNEL OF LOVE, THE WIZARD OF OZ and played Rosemary in PICNIC.

CAROL COOPER (June Yaeger) appeared in K.P.'s last production, THE SILVER THREAD. A graduate of U. of Cincinnati, Carol worked professionally in the Production Dept. of the Cincy Summer Playhouse and has appeared in stock and repertory companies in the midwest. She also studied Radio & TV techniques under a scholarship to the Cincy Conservatory of Music.

BOB VON BARGEN (Eddie Yaeger). This also is Bob's first venture with Kentwood. He was last seen as Senator Savage in CURIOUS SAVAGE, with the Footlight Theatre, Torrance. He has also done little theatre work in Oklahoma, Georgia and played in PAINT YOUR WAGON with The Wharf Theatre, Monterey, Calif. His college productions include, TALKING ABOUT JERUSALEM, STALAG 17 and 14th Century English Guild Plays.

SALLY PIERCE (Mrs. McIllhenny) has established herself as one of Kentwood's most versatile character actresses appearing in such varied plays as BLYTHE SPIRIT, MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT, MAYBE TUESDAY, THE SHRIKE and most recently in BORN YESTERDAY, as Senator Hedges' wife.

HARRY PIERCE (Mr. McIllhenny) has been with K.P. almost from its inception, appearing as an actor in THE DESPERATE HOURS, TAMING OF THE SHREW, and THE SHRIKE. Backstage, Harry has lent his talents in constructing the sets of A MIGHTY MAN and TEN LITTLE INDIANS among others. Sally and Harry are married in real life as well as in this play.

GREG BAKER (Vito). Although this is Greg's first appearance with Kentwood, he is no stranger to the theatre. He is presently appearing in THE ANDERSONVILLE TRIAL. Greg attends the Lawrence Parke Acting School in Hollywood.

VIOLETTE RASNICK (Giovanna). Kentwood theatre-goers will remember her as The Storyteller in SNOW WHITE, our Christmas play in 1962. She also has done "workshops" at UCLA and played Miriam in THE FIFTH SEASON for the West L.A. Temple group in 1963.

TED BAKER (Mauro) is appearing on the Kentwood stage for the first time. A student at Orville Wright in Westchester, Ted has appeared in such school plays as, MIND YOUR P'S & Q'S and SCHOOL DAYS.
