ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

GEORGE ANDRÉ has been a director and distinguished veteran of stage, radio, and television for more than 20 years. During his career he has performed with such outstanding talent as Geraldine Page, Imogene Coca, Burgess Meredith, and Robert Montgomery. His appearances at the Westchester Playhouse include TEN LITTLE INDIANS, A SHOT IN THE DARK and his Masque award-winning performance as Cardinal Woolsey in ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS. We are pleased to welcome him as director of this play.

WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST . . .

C. CLARKE BELL (Sasha) appears for the third time on Kentwood Players' stage, having been seen previously in ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS and our children's theatre production of THE SILVER THREAD. Clarke's background includes the Altadena Shakespeare Festival, the Cal Tech Players, and drama at the University of Arizona.

MEL OSHINS (Gordon Miller) has been a regular with the Players since he first appeared as the cabby in HARVEY. His last appearance was in A SHOT IN THE DARK. THE SHRIKE, LULLABY, and SNOW WHITE are also on his K.P. credits' list. Mel has been active as well in the Westchester Temple Theatre group.

MYRON COLE (Gribble) last appeared on the Kentwood stage as Blore in TEN LITTLE INDIANS. He has also been associated with the North American Players and the Footlight Theatre in Torrance in OUR TOWN, THE LATE CHRISTOPHER BEAN, SEE HOW THEY RUN, and DIRTY WORK AT THE CROSSROADS.

KARL THOMAS (Harry Binion) triples in brass with the Players for, in addition to his acting ability (DESPERATE HOUSE, EVERYBODY LOVES OPAL), he has directed (A SHOT IN THE DARK and THE DRUNKARD), and is currently vice-president and head of the production staff for the year.

JOHN BEISNER (Faker) was both stage manager and actor in A SHOT IN THE DARK. In ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS he portrayed Bishop Fisher. John won the award for best actor in a minor role for his part in JUDGMENT DAY at Morgan Theatre.

MARJORIE HODGES (Christine) is welcomed back to our stage after a lengthy absence. One of our first members, Marjorie will be remembered for her parts in CHICKEN EVERY SUNDAY, GEORGE WASHINGTON SLEPT HERE, ON THE BRIDGE AT MIDNIGHT, all at

the Barn. CRY HAVOC at the Westchester Playground and THE SLEEPING PRINCE at the Pumphouse are Marjorie's last K.P. ventures.

DON GORDON (Leo Davis) is making his debut on the Kentwood stage in this production. He contends his show business activities hit a certain high point several years ago when he was making TV commercials in Mexico for Coca Cola, while touring that country as an exhibition parachute jumper. Recently, bay area theatre goers saw him in MOON IS BLUE and BOY MEETS GIRL.

CAROL COOPER (Hilda) won the K.P. Masque Award last year for her supporting role in TIME OF THE CUCKOO. Carol also portrayed the mother in last year's children's show, THE SILVER THREAD. Back East, Carol appeared in SABRINA FAIR and has also been in two seasons of summer stock.

HARRY PIERCE (Gregory Wagner) is another of our early members and has assisted the Players many times in his field of special effects and stage design. For many years he worked for MGM as Master Prop Maker, as well as special effects. He first appeared on stage in THE DESPERATE HOURS, followed by TAMING OF THE SHREW, THE SHRIKE, and TIME OF THE CUCKOO.

JIM PINFOLD (Simon Jenkins) comes to Westchester from Lake Seneca, Wisconsin where he was active in little theatre. For K.P., Jim has had roles in TEN LITTLE INDIANS and ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS.

JIM HABIF (Timothy Hogarth) is a recent addition to the Kentwood Players' membership and his first stage appearance was as the barber in BORN YESTERDAY. He also participated in a workshop at one of the monthly meetings, THE LESSON by Ionescu.

FRANK PITT (Dr. Glass) is another K.P. member who is as active behind the scenes as he is on stage. He was stage manager for PICNIC; has served on the Board of Directors as production manager, house manager, and vice president. He is currently workshop coordinator. His stage appearances include ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS, RAINMAKER, HARVEY, and BORN YESTERDAY.

FARNOL FRANCIS (Senator Blake) is a charter member of K.P., and a director as well as actor. His production of ANNE LUCASTA at the Barn Theatre is still spoken of as one of our outstanding plays. He has also directed THE WIZARD OF OZ, MY THREE ANGELS and TIME OF THE CUCKOO. His acting assignments have been many and include roles in THE RAINMAKER, ALL THE KING'S MEN, and THE CURIOUS SAVAGE.
