

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

PAUL KAUFMAN herewith makes his directorial bow at Kentwood Players. An educational and community theatre director for the past twelve years Mr. Kaufman received his Masters Degree from Catholic University in Washington, D.C., and subsequently taught and directed the dramatic program at St. Louis University and College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, Minnesota, For four years he served as managing director of Town Theatre, Columbia, South Carolina, the oldest community theatre in continuous operation in the United States. While at Town Theatre, Mr. Kaufman designed, directed and produced some thirty productions, including six full-scale musicals. Since coming to Los Angeles two years ago, Mr. Kaufman has been Assistant Professor of Speech and Communication Arts at Lovola University as well as directing and designing five productions for the Del Rev Players at the University. Most recently, he conceived and directed a concert reading. THE HEAD THAT WEARS THE CROWN, for the Ebell Theatre Society. A new member of Kentwood Players' board of directors, Mr. Kaufman serves on the play selection committee.

ABOUT THE CAST . . .

HARVEY ROSENBERG (Speed) makes his acting debut with this production. A new Kentwood Players member, Harvey has accomplished an amazing amount of work with us in a very short time. He helped with set dressing and construction for ROSE TATTOO and took the publicity pictures for that production. Harvey was stage manager for Kentwood's award-winning COME BLOW YOUR HORN as well as providing artwork for the production. As further proof of his considerable artistic talents, Harvey designed the program cover and executed the character portraits in the lobby for that production. So as to not let any grass grow under his feet, Harvey then worked on props for A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS and in addition to being in THE ODD COUPLE, he also designed the program cover. Born in Brooklyn, New York, Harvey majored in art and also attended the Society of Arts and Crafts in Detroit.

DICK BEGA (Murray) has been a Kentwood Players member since his appearance in our 1967 Los Angeles County Festival award-winning A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE. Since then he has appeared in CARL SANDBURG, YES, and THE ROSE TATTOO as well as several workshop productions. Dick and his lovely wife, Marlene, make Kentwood a family affair. Dick's two youngsters were in THE ROSE TATTOO and four members of the family participated in a workshop production. Dick has just been elected to our board of directors and will serve as mailing list chairman.

TOM TURQUAND (Roy) has been a Kentwood member for some five years. He first appeared on our stage in TEAHOUSE OF THE AUGUST MOON, and has since taken part in workshop productions. With tongue-in-cheek, Tom claims that his appearances at Kentwood are made to keep his wife Dee, also appearing in this production, out of trouble.

KARL THOMAS (Vinnie) is a long-time member of Kentwood and a lifelong theatre man. He studied drama at L.A.J.C. and performed for fifteen years with the Los Angeles production of THE DRUNKARD. playing character parts and doing song and dance numbers. A regular on the Tom Harmon television sports show as a pantomimist. Karl has also appeared in such local productions as BUS STOP, PHYSICIAN IN SPITE OF HIMSELF, ARMS AND THE MAN and TWELVE ANGRY MEN. A past president of Kentwood Players, Karl has served several terms on the board of directors as well as having appeared in our productions of THE DESPERATE HOURS, ROOM SERVICE and THE IRREGULAR VERB TO LOVE. He won Kentwood's Masque Award for best actor in a minor role for his work in THE TENTH MAN. Never one to limit his talents. Karl has also been one of Kentwood's most stalwart directors. having guided home productions of THE DRUNKARD, A SHOT IN THE DARK and A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM last summer.

JERRY KRANE (Oscar Madison) is another recent member of Kentwood Players who has managed to amass an amazing number of hours of work with us. He first appeared on our stage in the awardwinning A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE, closely followed by a stint as stage manager for A MAJORITY OF ONE. This season he was seen as Alvaro in THE ROSE TATTOO, and most recently toured with a workshop production of an original play, SHROUDS HAVE NO POCKETS. Jerry is a new member of our board of directors and will serve as membership chairman.

IRV ROSEN (Felix Ungar) is a familiar favorite with Kentwood audiences. A long time K.P. member, Irv has served on the board for some five years. On stage he has appeared in SEND ME NO FLOWERS, DETECTIVE STORY and JANUS. His performance as Snogg in RED SHOES won him the 1961 K.P. Best Actor award; he has twice been honored by Masque awards for best supporting actor for his work in THE TENTH MAN and A THOUSAND CLOWNS. In 1967 Irv was honored with the best actor award presented by the Los Angeles County Adult drama Festival for his work in the Festival-winning A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE.

MICHAEL FLOOD (Gwendolyn Pigeon) shows all the earmarks of becoming a very active Kentwood member. She first appeared on our stage in our last production A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS and returns immediately for this production. A speech and drama graduate from Barat College in Illinois, Michael has appeared in such productions as ANTIGONE, EAST LYNN, AS YOU LIKE IT and GLASS MENAGERIE on an intercontinental basis, having attended Loyola University in Rome as well as studying in New York and San Francisco.

DEE TURQUAND (Cecily Pigeon) has been active with Kentwood for several years. She first appeared on our stage in TEAHOUSE OF THE AUGUST MOON and substituted for one weekend in A MAJORITY OF ONE. Active on the other side of the footlights as well, Dee has done props for SUNDAY IN NEW YORK and A THOUSAND CLOWNS. She claims that she's is this production to keep husband Tom out of trouble?
