ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

ARKY MARCOM in addition to having been an actor, director, and behind-the-scenes worker with Kentwood Players since the group was organized in 1949, was one of the co-founders of the group 18 years ago. He last directed THE IRREGULAR VERB TO LOVE. Other directing credits include TEAHOUSE OF THE AUGUST MOON, EVERY-BODY LOVES OPAL, PAPA IS ALL, JANUS, LO AND BEHOLD, THE CURIOUS SAVAGE, and A HUSBAND FOR BREAKFAST (Kentwood's winning entry in the 1957 annual Pacific One-Act Play Tourney).

ABOUT THE CAST . . .

FRED WEST (Murray Burns) though new to Kentwood's stage, has enough credits in all aspects of theatrical activity to fill this page. He studied in New York at Theatre East with Abe Weine, and has toured extensively. A rich baritone, Fred has performed in many musicals, most recently in MOST HAPPY FELLA, as well as having appeared locally in non-musicals such as NOBODY LOVES AN ALBATROSS. His directorial talents include RATTLE OF A SIMPLE MAN, TEAHOUSE OF THE AUGUST MOON, and HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS WITHOUT REALLY TRYING.

BRAD LEIGHTON (Nick Burns) is a sophomore at Beverly Hills High School. Although this is his first Kentwood Players production, he has packed a great deal of theatre activity into his young life. Brad appeared in the U.C.L.A. Theatre Group's production of ARDELLE, in 1965, as well as the Valley Teen Center's BYE, BYE BIRDIE, which toured the local high schools. He was seen in BABES IN ARMS, which also toured the local high schools. Brad is the son of local disc-jockey and Kentwood Player Jerry Leighton.

GEORGE HEDGES (Albert Amundson) was last seen on Kentwood's stage as the harrassed son-in-law Jerry, in A MAJORITY OF ONE. He has taught drama for six years in the L.A. city schools, and is a member of the Shakespeare Workshop. George received the Best Actor award in 1966 for his first role with Kentwood, as Bob in MARY, MARY.

MITZI C. PHILLIPS (Sandra Markowitz) is another newcomer to Kentwood, but no stranger to the theatre world. Mitzi attended the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York, where she appeared as Lizzie in RAINMAKER, and Mary in DETECTIVE STORY. While in New York she also portrayed Nina in the Helen Hayes Equity Theatre production of the SEAGULL. Locally Mitzi has been seen as Blanche in STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE; Maria in SOUND OF MUSIC; and Cecely in ERNEST IN LOVE.

MURRAY AIBINDER (Arnold Burns) joins Kentwod Players for the first time, after having been active in little theatre locally and in his former home in Massachusetts. Murray has appeared previously as Walter Mitty in THURBER CARNIVAL, and in THE TENTH MAN.

IRV ROSEN (Leo Herman) is a familiar favorite with Kentwood audiences. A long time K.P. member, Irv has served on the Board of Directors for five years, and is currently the Workshop Chairman. On stage, he has appeared in SEND ME NO FLOWERS, DETECTIVE STORY, and JANUS. His performance as Snogg in RED SHOES won him the 1961 K.P. Best Actor award, and in 1965 he was awarded K.P.'s Best Supporting Actor award for his role in TENTH MAN. Most recently Irv was honored with the Best Actor award presented by the Los Angeles County Adult Drama Festival, for his portrayal of Mr. Alfieri in Kentwood Players' winning festival entry, A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE.
