

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR ...

MONTY ASH is an actor, writer, producer and director. What else can we ask of this fabulous man? A native of England, Monty brings a lifetime of theatrical experience to our stage. His career began when he was a child in English pantomimes. He attended the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts and has been active in the theatre ever since. Both coasts of the United States have been fortunate to view his talents. In 1967 he directed A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE for K.P. and later the play was entered in the Los Angeles County Drama Festival, for which he won the best director award. Some of his other directorial credits were A CASE OF LIBEL and TORCHBEARERS. Monty produced and acted in DON'T DRINK THE WATER and BEST MAN. As a lighting director, we must remember some of his best: MAN OF LA MANCHA, FIDDLER ON THE ROOF and TORCHBEARERS. He was last seen as the Rabbi in FIDDLER ON THE ROOF. In 1973 he directed INHERIT THE WIND. Last season he directed ALL MY SONS.

ABOUT THE PRODUCER ...

BILL HARRED, a past Board Member. He has been a member of K.P. for over eight years and has done technical work such as lighting, sound and construction. He was last seen working the spotlights for CABARET, which is not an easy job. His first job as producer was in THE BEST MAN.

ABOUT THE CAST . . .

DAVID MIZRAHI (Victor Franz) is a 15-year member of K.P. and is on the Board of Directors. He appeared in the special production of DARK SOUL OF THE GENTLE SEX. He was seen in THE DEVIL'S ADVOCATE. He won the best actor award at the 1967 Adult Drama Festival for his dramatic role in VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE. Dave has appeared in scores of K.P. productions, including DARK AT THE TOP OF THE STAIRS, BORN YESTERDAY, GUYS AND DOLLS and DETECTIVE STORY. He has appeared in community theatres in Southern California and has directed many K.P. productions. Has appeared in community theatre in PLAY IT AGAIN SAM. Was last seen on K.P. stage in ALL MY SONS.

JEANETTE LYONS (Esther Franz), a member of K.P. for nine years. She is known as one of the "old regulars." Was last seen in SILENT NIGHT, LONELY NIGHT which won her the Best Actress Award for 1974. In 1973 she won the Best Actress Award in the A.D.A. Festival for her performance in REST IN PEACE. She first appeared on our stage in A MAJORITY OF ONE. Other credits are CACTUS FLOWER, I CAN'T HEAR YOU WHEN THE WATER'S RUNNING, OUR TOWN, LOOK HOMEWARD ANGEL, etc. A former child actress, Jeanette was a drama teacher at Webster College, and Producer/Director of Educational TV Series for the University of South Carolina. Has an M.F.A. in Drama from Catholic University. Served as Program Chairman, Board Member and Play's Committee Member.

IRV ROSEN (Gregory Solomon). Currently on the Board of Directors. Has been a member of K.P. for more than 18 years. Some of his outstanding performances are A CASE OF LIBEL, RED SHOES, THE TENTH MAN, A THOUSAND CLOWNS, at which time he received the K.P. Masque Award. Other stage credits are ODD COUPLE. SEND ME NO FLOWERS, DETECTIVE STORY. In 1967 he received the Best Actor Award at the A.D.A. Festival for his role in A VIEW FROM THE BRIDE. He was last seen in PLAZA SUITE. Has directed OUR TOWN, and for the A.D.A. Festival, CHAMBER MUSIC.

CHUCK REYNOLDS (Walter Franz) was last seen on our stage in ABSENCE OF A CELLO which won him the K.P. Masque Award. Other K.P. awards that Chuck walked away with were, ALL THE KING'S MEN, THE TENDER TRAP, and WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? Received his training in Theatre Arts at the Canterbury School of Expression, Chicago, and National Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York. His talents have been seen in Montreal, Baltimore, San Diego, etc. He is a talented Set Designer, and has constructed and designed many K.P. sets. His talents do not end here. In 1966 he directed THE HAPPY TIME and previous to that spent a year with the Hollywood Shakespearean Repertory Theatre. Other credits are BORN YESTERDAY, THE PRICE (Chapel) and an original musical, FAT.
