ABOUT THE DIRECTOR . . .

Veteran man-about-Kentwood, IRV ROSEN, picks up the directional baton for this challenging production after a frief respite from directorship assignments. Notwithstanding, Irv has been very much in evidence at K.P., deeply ensconced in every other phase of theatre. His credits as director in his long, over 21-year membership tenure include the "special" production of OUR TOWN, the workshop I'M HERBERT, which traveled the Los Angeles circuits for a couple of years playing to church groups, the Shriners and Masons and CHAMBER MUSIC, acclaimed at the ADA festival. A past President of our group, Irv's acting and production capabilities have earned him accolades over the past two decades.

ABOUT THE PRODUCER

PAUL MAZEROV (Dodi's better half)?, a 5-year member, former production manager and board member, chalks up another victory with this presentation. Memorable past productions such as COMPANY and OKLAHOMA were dynamic examples of his achievements in design techniques and CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF won him a Best Producer Award. His scenic designing is historical for such presentations as SOUND OF MUSIC, ROYAL GAMBIT, 6 RMS RIV VU and PRISONER OF SECOND AVENUE. Additionally, Paul has an impressive list of stage performances.

ABOUT THE SET DESIGNER . . .

CHARLES REYNOLDS, a 20-year plus member, has a monumental record of set designing. Beginning in the early 60's, when the Westchester Playhouse doors first opened, his design capabilities were outstanding in such productions as HARVEY, THE HAPPY TIME, CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF, AUNTIE MAME, MARY, MARY, THE GLASS MENAGERIE, THE PRICE (set construction), and TAMING OF THE SHREW — to name a few. This current production marks his "umpteenth" superlative effort.

ABOUT THE CAST . . .

DODI MAZEROV (The Woman), Paul's better half?, a four-time Vice President of Kentwood and a 27-year member, is a mistress-of-all-trades, a firstrate performer and a very special talent in theatrical endeavors. STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE, SUMMER AND SMOKE, ALL THE KING'S MEN, WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? AND BUTTERFLIES ARE FREE were all Masque Award acting winners for her. She won Best Directing honors for MAN OF LA MANCHA and CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF and Producing laurels for VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE and TAMING OF THE SHREW.

CHARLES REYNOLDS (The Man), really is "the man" in this production (see Set Designer credits). An acting buff since high school days, Charles studies with the New York Academy of Theatre Arts and the Canterbury School of Expression in Chicago. Touring with Clare Tree Major Productions, he has appeared in community and little theatre stage presentations throughout the United States. In 1960, he first appeared in MY THREE ANGELS for K.P. ALL THE KING'S MEN, TENDER TRAP AND WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? are only some of the productions garnering Masque Awards for his performances. In 1979, he directed I NEVER SANG FOR MY FATHER and we last saw him on stage in TWELVE ANGRY MEN.

GABRIELLE DE CUIR-CARR (The Girl). Who can forget THE MIRACLE WORKER and Gabrielle's powerful portrayal of Helen Keller's tutor, Annie Sullivan, which won the Best Actress award for her! Her background in fine arts education and motion picture experience was acquired in London, Paris and Rome. A 6-year member and Hugh O'Brian contest finalist, she holds a degree from UCLA in Theatre Arts and appeared on our stage as Anne Boleyn in ROYAL GAMBIT. Other stage performances include Midsummer Night's Dream, The Innocent and Once Upon a Mattress.

ROBERT NEWMAN (The Young Man) makes his Kentwood debut in this production. A full-time Theatre Arts major at Cal State, Northridge, he has 5 years of acting experience, having studied with Tom Troupe and Charles Nelson Reilly. He was involved in acting seminars with Malcolm McDowell and Mary Steenbergen and is currently enrolled at Lee Strasberg Theatre Institute. His past performances in leading roles at colleges and community theatres include Guys and Dolls, Bye, Bye Birdie, West Side Story, As You Like It, The Rainmaker, Titus Andronicus, The Owl and the Pussycat and Medea.
